Plymouth

Newburyport

Marblehead

If there ever was a perfect waterfront enclave that boasts of beaches, hiking trails, and historical elements, it is Marblehead. The houses here date back to the 17th century and make for a great view from the parking at Bank Square. Some of the most famous places in Marblehead include Jeremiah Lee Mansion and Garden and the Little Harbor Lobster Company.
